Stella's Story

Life hasn't been easy for Stella. Growing up, she had a chaotic home life, and at 16, became a teen mother. She and her son moved around a lot, eventually ending up at a homeless shelter in Vacaville. That's when she began to turn her life around. Taking a hard look at herself, she changed her outlook, picked a new path, chose a better direction.

Staff at the shelter helped her move into her first apartment. For the first time, she and her son had their own home. Then she met someone, fell in love and had two more children. For awhile, it seemed that her life was settling down. But that relationship ended and she was on her own again. However, Stella didn't lose focus on staying on that new path and improving her family's life.

A new job with Solano County improved her economic stability but also presented a challenge – how to find safe affordable housing now that she no longer qualified for low income assistance. An ad for a Family Orientation Session at Solano Napa Habitat for Humanity caught Stella's eye. The meeting room was filled with people with needs just like hers. Despite the odds,

Contacts are being actively pursued in Napa County to begin projects there and ground has been broken in Fairfield and construction begun on the Habitat Corner project for three new homes.
